

The Kibworth School

Pupil Premium report October 2016

The Kibworth School receives Pupil Premium funding from the Government in respect of disadvantaged pupils. The level of funding the school receives from the government is based on the number of pupils who claim Free School Meals, (pupils who have been registered for free school meals (FSM) or those who claimed FSM in the last 6 years). Additional Funding is also provided for 'looked after' children (looked after continuously by the local authority for more than six months), the number of pupils who have been adopted and the number of pupils from service families. The funding is targeted to ensure that every pupil has the best possible chance of achieving their full potential at school whilst experiencing exciting enrichment opportunities beyond the curriculum. This report refers to the use of Pupil Premium funding during the academic year 2015 to 2016.

Headlines 2015-16

14% of pupils in the school are eligible for pupil premium.

82% of year 9 pupils eligible for pupil premium made a minimum of one sub-level of progress (Level 5+) and 59% making two or more sub-levels of progress in English (Level 6+) compared to 82% (Level 5+) of non-eligible pupils making a minimum of one sub-level of progress and 48% (Level 6+) making two or more sub-levels of progress.

53% of year 9 pupils eligible for pupil premium made a minimum of one sub-level of progress (Level 5+) and 18% making two or more sub-levels of progress (Level 6+) in Maths compared to 40% of non-eligible pupils progress and 24% (Level 6+) making two or more sub-levels of progress.

41% of year 9 pupils eligible for pupil premium achieved one or more sub-level of progress in English and Maths compared to 33% of non-eligible pupils.

Three sub-levels equate to one level of progress.

Progress made by pupils eligible for pupil premium is similar or above that of non-eligible pupils in English and Maths

Intervention	Impact
Lexia Reading Programme	This is a computer based programme that tracks and monitors reading development in students on an individual basis. Students completing this progressed successfully through the programme to Level 1 and 2.
Inclusion Support Assistant	24 pupils accessed and attended one to one sessions focussing on self – esteem and confidence, of these 7 pupils were pupil premium. These 7 pupils achieved an average attendance of 95.7%. Whole school attendance was 95.6%
Curriculum Enhancement and out of hours opportunities	Funding was used to support pupils in a variety of different ways, for example the purchase of subject revision guides, music lessons, uniform, trips and educational visits. This supported their engagement and participation and built up their self-esteem and confidence.
Small group Language Development	5 pupils eligible for pupil premium were withdrawn from Spanish for language development during 2015 -16. In Year 7 the group size was ten of which 3 pupils were pupil premium. These 3 pupils are currently working at or above their end of key stage target grade. In Year 9 the group size was 6 of which 2 were pupil premium. These 2 pupils are currently working at or above their end of key stage target grade.
Looked After Children	One to one Maths tuition was provided by the specialist teaching service for 30 mins once a week. There were 3 looked after pupils eligible for pupil premium who benefitted from this. Those that took part showed an improvement in maths, with only one of the three continuing to have a one to one session in this academic year (2016-2017). The attendance of the 3 looked after children was 100%
